Four Negro students sat at a dimestore lunch counter in Greensboro, N.C. on February 1st, 1960 and ordered cups of coffee. This simple act sparked a Southwide student protest against racial segregation that came to be known around the world as the Sit-Ins. Twelve months after the Greensboro incident, more than 70,000 Negroes (with some white supporters) had challenged segregated public facilities in the South and nearly 4,000 had been arrested and iailed.

The Third Anniversary of the Sit-Ins finds a growing army of Negro and white youth giving new dimension to the struggle for equality. In the hard core areas of Alabama, Georgia and Mississippi a revolutionary mass movement is taking root. Members of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee take a year or more from their studies and livelihoods to work in voterregistration and direct action. They work for subsistence only, and have faced mob-violence and constant harassment. They are our real Domestic Peace Corps. This benefit will help them to push forward the frontiers of freedom and human dignity.
